# **Holiday Report**

#### 26th December 2017: Transfer from Madrid to Casa Rural El Recuerdo.

Sally and Mark arrived a few minutes ahead of schedule just before 21.00 at Madrid airport. Passport control and luggage pick-up was swift and soon we were heading off into the evening traffic on the southern part of the Madrid ring-road and then to the motorway south-west for Extremadura. There were a few periods of light rain on the way, but we managed the journey without the need to stop and reached Casa Rural El Recuerdo just before midnight.

#### 27th December 2017: Monfragüe National Park

It was quite windy during the night and it remained breezy right through the day. However, for most of the day it was sunny so the conditions were excellent at the Monfragüe National Park. To get there we drove north from Trujillo, through a vast landscape of *dehesa*. A few **Red Kites** were seen first thing and parties of **Common Cranes** in the fields. During the morning we were accompanied by David Lindo (The Urban Birder) and some of his pals and most convivial it was too. We stopped first of all at the hugely impressive gorge of Peña Falcón, where a couple of hundred **Griffon Vultures** were soaring the sky, along with a few **Black Vultures**. From time to time a **Peregrine** circled with them, completely dwarfed.

At the little hamlet of Villarreal de San Carlos in the centre of the park, we found a mixed feeding party of finches at the carport, including Linnets, a Greenfinch and, most interestingly of all, a male Citril Finch. Thekla Larks fed beside them. Black Redstarts were also present. We then drove through the park to a northern viewpoint of the Portilla del Tiétar, where more vultures were present. Here we watched a male Blue Rock Thrush feeding on a crayfish. Crag Martins hawked insects over the top of the outcrop. Eventually a Spanish Imperial Eagle appeared in view, tantalizingly distant, wheeling high overhead with some vultures.

After coffee (where we had a high flyover from a **Bonelli's Eagle**) we returned to the Portilla del Tiétar and we rewarded by much better views of the eagle as well as an adult **Black Stork**. We had our picnic at the Tajadilla viewpoint, with both **Griffon** and **Black Vultures** also constantly overhead.

We retraced our steps and stopped beside the Tagus River for a walk overlooking the old medieval Cardinal's Bridge. Small birds were evident such as **Long-tailed Tits**, **Blackcaps**, **Chaffinches** and brief views of **Hawfinch**. Finally, we ended our visit where we had started, at the Peña Falcon viewpoint, enjoying the sight of dozens of vultures overhead.

# 28<sup>th</sup> December 2017: Plains of Campo Lugar, Alcollarín Reservoir and rice fields near Palazuelo

The day dawned heavily overcast with drizzle. The rain cleared, but it was very windy the whole day, although we did have a few breaks in the cloud too. We headed south, through the town of Zorita and then onto the plains near Campo Lugar. At our first stop we found a group of about 15 **Great Bustard**, as well as seeing two in flight. Three **Black-bellied Sandgrouse** flew close by. But it was the large number of small birds which were particularly impressive: **Skylarks**, **Calandra Larks**, **Meadow Pipits** and **Corn Buntings**. **Red Kites** and **Marsh Harriers** glided across the plains, and parties of **Common Cranes** crossed our view. **Iberian Grey Shrikes** were quite common on the fences.

We took a rough track, seeing several **Hoopoes** and, reaching two pools, we stopped to watch parties of duck: **Mallard**, **Teal**, **Wigeon**, **Pintail** and **Gadwall**. A **Spoonbill** was also busily feeding. We noticed a dark object in a bare tree and discovered that it was a **Golden Eagle**. We watched it at length until it flew off (having raised the interest of a **Marsh Harrier**), the white blazes on its wings and tail telling us that it was a young bird.

As we approached the village of Campo Lugar, we saw a **Cattle Egret** being harassed by a **Raven**, apparently trying to steal food from it. It forced the **Cattle Egret** to the ground, where it seemed trapped. Soon a second **Raven** appeared and then a **Marsh Harrier**. Concerned that it was perhaps ensnared on a fence we went to check. The egret was fine and flew off, seemingly none the worse for its ordeal.

Coffee was taken at a friendly bar just outside the village and from there we went to the nearby Alcollarín Reservoir. We had a picnic lunch beside a small pool, where throngs of **Chiffchaffs**, **White Wagtails** and **Crag Martins** hawked insects. A party of **Pochard** were present as well. We stopped near the dam and saw three species of grebe: Little, **Great Crested** and two smart **Black-necked**.

The afternoon was spent driving slowly through the rice fields near Palazuelo. Here we saw large numbers of Common Cranes and several egrets, but there were two main attractions. First the flocks of small birds: **Red Avadavats**, **Common Waxbills**, **Spanish Sparrows** and **Tree Sparrows**, and secondly were the waders. The **Dunlin** were the most numerous, but we were able to watch **Ringed**, **Little Ringed** and **Kentish Plovers** all in the same field. We also had excellent views of **Water Pipits**.

# 29<sup>th</sup> December 2017: Plains west of Trujillo and north of Santa Marta de Magasca, followed by Belén Plains.

It was damp and misty first thing, but once we had come off the hills onto the plains to the west of Trujillo, we were out of the mist and during the day the westerly winds brought periods of sunny spells, which were a welcome break from the otherwise heavily overcast conditions. We spent the first park of the morning on plains just outside Trujillo where we had magnificent views of nearly 50 **Great Bustards**, parties of **Pintailed Sandgrouse** in flight and several **Black-bellied Sandgrouse** on the ground. But perhaps best of all was the spectacle of a **Merlin** in pursuit of a **Meadow Pipit**, attracting the attention of another **Merlin**, which joined in the attack. It appeared that miraculously the **Meadow Pipit** escaped.

After coffee in the little village of Santa Marta de Magasca we paused at the top of a valley overlooking the Tamuja River. Several **Red Kites** and vultures cruised overhead. We then had our picnic beside the Magasca River, where before we had put sandwich

to mouth, we were watching a displaying pair of **Golden Eagles**. After lunch, we were then rewarded by a view of an **Otter**.

As we drove back up onto the plains, we stopped to watch an immature **Spanish Imperial Eagle**. Another was seen even closer and then we saw a fine adult perched on a rock under the watchful eye of a cow. A little further along the road we had excellent views of a hunting male **Hen Harrier**.

We then headed to the Belen plains to the east of Trujillo. Here we had wonderful views of a **Little Owl**, but most important was the discovery of a flock of 61 **Little Bustards** which we saw initially in flight and then enjoyed watching them on the ground, where they preened, rested and foraged. We ended the day with a short visit to admire the Main Square of Trujillo.

# 30<sup>th</sup> December: Arrocampo Reservoir and return to Madrid

The day was brighter than it had been over the last couple of days, with the clouds gradually breaking during the day. We bade farewell to Casa Rural El Recuerdo and took the A5 motorway towards Madrid. Passing the town of Almaráz, we headed towards the Arrocampo Reservoir. No sooner than we had approached, we saw our target species for the day: a superb **Black-winged Kite** perched on a roadside telegraph pole. Fortunately, there was a place to park off the road and we could enjoy prolonged views of this stunning bird as it perched, preened, flew between perches and hovered. A second bird was perched on a small bush not that far away.

We parked close to the edge of the marsh and spent an hour or so walking beside the **Typha** fringing vegetation. Here we could hear often the toy trumpet calls of **Purple Swamphens** (occasionally affording us glimpses as well) and **Cetti's Warblers**. **Chiffchaffs** were abundant. We stopped when we heard the thin, high-pitched calls of **Penduline Tits** and managed to see a male briefly several times. From the same spot

Mark spotted a **Wryneck** which was an excellent find. He also saw briefly a **Great Bittern** that had been disturbed by fisherman before disappearing in a nearby reedbed.

We saw out first **White Storks** of the holiday, whilst both **Kingfishers** and **Marsh Harriers** were seen several times. After coffee, we returned to another section of marsh, where as well as **Purple Swamphen** and **White Stork**, we also had good views of **Zitting Cisticola** and two **Bluethroat**.

It was then time to leave for Madrid. The journey on the motorway with very little traffic went according to plan, with sightings of more **White Storks** and many **Red Kites** on the way. Just before entering Madrid, a party of seven **Little Bustard** flew over the road. A nice surprise and a fitting conclusion to this short winter break.

- **37. Water Rail**: Calling at Arrocampo on 30<sup>th</sup> December.
