**5**<sup>th</sup> **May 2018**: Transfer from Madrid airport to Casa Rural El Recuerdo, with stops at Vladecañas Reservoir and Cerro de Almaráz

6th May 2018: Plains of Campo Lugar and Alcollarín Reservoir

7th May 2018: Monfragüe National Park

8th May 2018: Exploring the plains west of Trujillo

**9<sup>th</sup> May 2018**: Sierra Brava Reservoir, River Ruercas, River Guadiana at Don Benito, rice fields near Palazuelo.

10<sup>th</sup> May 2018: Heath and cork oak groves of Jaraicejo, Miravete Pass and Trujillo

**11<sup>th</sup> May 2018**: Alange Reservoir, Almendralejo, River Guadiana and Roman Bridge Mérida

**12<sup>th</sup> May 2018**: Rice fields near Vegas Altas, Moheda Alta, Villuercas Mountains and Madroñera.

13<sup>th</sup> May 2018: Arrocampo Reservoir, Gredos Mountains. Navarredondo de los Gredos.

14th May 2018: Gredos Mountains and return to Madrid.

#### **TOUR REPORT**

## 5<sup>th</sup> May 2018: Transfer from Madrid airport to Casa Rural El Recuerdo

Martin met the group at Terminal Four at Madrid Airport at about 11.00 and despite stormy weather we had a good run from the airport, around the southern side of Madrid and on to the A5 motorway for Extremadura. An initial stop at a service station on the motorway gave us the first views of **Cinereous Vulture** and **Eurasian Griffin**. We stopped at the Valdecañas Reservoir for lunch, with an adult **Yellow-legged Gull** seen and a **Eurasian Golden Oriole** seen briefly in flight. Our final stop was at the Cerro Almaráz where we found the tail-end of the spring orchids with Yellow Bee, Early Spider, Naked Man, Narrow-flowered Tongue and Champagne Orchids still in flower. Our first **Booted Eagle** of the holiday was seen, vultures drifted overhead and a **European Serin** was singing. As we arrived at Casa Rural El Recuerdo, a **Common Nightingale** was in full song.

## 6th May 2018: Plains of Campo Lugar and Alcollarín Reservoir

We spent the morning on the open plains south of the town of Zorita, close to the village of Campo Lugar. Here we quickly found a group of about 20 **Great Bustards**, including some displaying males. **Gull-billed Terns** hawked over the meadows as did a **Montagu's Harrier**. A **Eurasian Thick-knee** was found in a recently ploughed field. **Little Owl** was seen standing on rocks emerging from the fields. In one area we saw a **Short-toed Snake Eagle** perched on an electricity tower, whilst a bit further on we had superb views of a male **Little Bustard** as well as **European Rollers** with their electric blue wings. **Lesser Kestrels** were in small groups hovering over the wonderfully flower-rich meadows and during the time spent on the plains we found four species of lark.

At a pit stop, close to Campo Lugar, we watched a huge **Common House Martin** colony on an old grain silo, where **Lesser Kestrels** were also nesting.

The rest of the day was spent at the Alcollarín Reservoir. Here we followed dirt tracks on either side of the water body, along the edge of beautiful holm oak *dehesa* woodland, where again the flowers were magnificent. Where we had our picnic, **Common Cuckoos** and **Great Reed Warblers** were in song. **European Bee-eaters** 

were nesting on the roadside bank and on the water itself **Great Crested Grebes** were in full display. We also found a **Common Redshank** and some **Eared Grebes**.

#### 7<sup>th</sup> May 2018: Monfragüe National Park

It was a fine day with some cloud in the morning and a storm threatening at the end of the afternoon. We drove north through the seemingly endless expanse of *dehesa* to enter the Monfragüe National Park on its northern side, making our first stop at the Portilla del Tiétar rock face. Soon after we had arrived a **Spanish Eagle** flew in and we were treated with a superb performance, watching it perched, in flight and at times giving short mobbing chases to **Eurasian Griffins**. A **Rock Bunting** sang on several occasions from the rock behind our viewpoint. We then entered an area of cork oak, where we watched a **Short-toed Snake Eagle** hovering and saw **Eurasian Golden Oriole**, **Eurasian Nuthatch** and **Western Orphean Warbler**.

Nearby we could admire a nesting **Egyptian Vulture** beside the Tiétar River and a few **Cinereous Vultures** drifted over.

Our picnic was at the edge of a pine wood overlooking the Tiétar River, where we took a walk to enjoy views of singing **Short-toed Treecreeper**, flypasts of **Egyptian Vulture** and more **Cinereous Vultures**.

At the Puerto de Serrana, we had views of both **Subalpine Warbler** and **Sardinian Warbler**, and a **Bonelli's Eagle** amongst a kettle of **Eurasian Griffins**.

We had excellent views of **Thekla's Lark** close to the hamlet of Villarreal de San Carlos and then descending to the mixed woodland beside the Tagus River, we watched a **Hawfinch**, saw **Eurasian Robins** and **Alpine Swifts** were nesting under a road bridge, along with large numbers of **Common House Martins**.

We completed our visit at the massive rock of Peña Falcon. There we had superb views of **Blue Rock Thrush**, **Western Orphean Warbler** and **Black Redstart**. **Eurasian Griffins** descended to land on the rock face, whilst several **Black Storks** were watched at nest sites.

## 8<sup>th</sup> May 2018: Exploring the plains west of Trujillo

It was a cloudy start, but with warm sunshine later in the day. The below-average temperatures made a day on the open plains seem especially attractive, to be able to watch birds without undue heat shimmer. At our first stop we were able to watch **Pin**-

**tailed Sandgrouse** rather distantly in flight. A male **Montagu's Harrier** quartered the open terrain. We also saw a group of **Great Bustard**.

After a break, we drove along the road to the village of Santa Marta de Magasca where thanks to the provision of nest boxes we had wonderful views of European Rollers, as well as Lesser Kestrel, Eurasian Kestrel and Little Owl. We followed a dirt track, where we saw two Great Spotted Cuckoos and in terrain with rather shorter vegetation, had flight views of Black-bellied Sandgrouse, some quite close, more distant Pin-tailed Sandgrouse and an even more distant Golden Eagle. Taking our picnic at the River Tamuja, we admired yet again the colour of the wild flowers and watched European Bee-eaters. A Wood Lark was singing overhead.

North of the village of Santa Marta de Magasca, we stopped beside the River Magasca, where we watched **Eurasian Crag Martins** and had glimpses of **Cetti's Warbler** and **Long-tailed Tits**. Further north we walked on a medieval drovers' trail and watched **Greater Short-toed Larks**. On our back to Trujillo, where we made a short stop in the main square and visited a park, we had good views of **Red-legged Partridge** and admire a colony of **White Storks** on an old 19<sup>th</sup> century water mill.

## 9<sup>th</sup> May 2018: Sierra Brava Reservoir, River Ruercas, River Guadiana at Don Benito, rice fields near Palazuelo.

The day started rather misty and cool but became brighter in the afternoon.

Our first stop was beside the Sierra Brava Reservoir, south of Zorita, where we watched a colony of **Lesser Kestrel** using a derelict barn. A fine male **Eurasian Marsh-harrier** was seen and we had good views of **Gull-billed Terns**.

A stop for **Collared Pratincoles** on the edge of the rice fields near Fernando V was in vain, but beside the River Ruercas we had views of **Red Avadavat** and some **Cetti's Warblers** and **Eurasian Tree Sparrows**. We then drove south to explore an area beside the River Guadiana, near Don Benito. Here we had fleeting views of **Western Olivaceous Warbler**, but could listen to its song, saw a **Garden Warbler**, **Great Reed** and **Eurasian Reed Warblers**, **Eurasian Golden Orioles** and had some great views of **Little Bittern** in flight.

The afternoon was spent on the rice fields near Palazuelo, we found some parties of **Common Ringed Plover**, **Kentish Plover** and **Dunlin**, with more sightings of **Gull-billed Terns**.

### 10<sup>th</sup> May 2018: Heath and cork oak groves of Jaraicejo, Miravete Pass and Trujillo

The weather started off as misty, but by the time we reached our first stop it was calm with a clear blue sky.

We drove north-east for twenty minutes, stopping first on the beautiful heath above Jaraicejo. This is a lavender and broom dominated landscape, skirted by cork oak groves. We very quickly found **Dartford Warbler** and it was not long before we also had obtained good views of **Spectacled Warbler**. **Thekla's Larks** were abundant, as were the ubiquitous **Corn Buntings**. We walked into a cork oak grove, at the edge of which we saw **Western Orphean Warbler**. In the woodland, we found **Short-toed Treecreeper**,

Close by, near the Arroyo de la Vid, we eventually got good views of **Common Nightingale** and **Melodious Warbler**.

We stopped at the Miravete Pass for our picnic.

The afternoon was an opportunity for some free time, with some accompany Martin on a visit of Trujillo.

# 11<sup>th</sup> May 2018: Alange Reservoir, Almendralejo, River Guadiana and Roman Bridge Mérida

We headed south-west with a first stop beside the massive Alange Reservoir, the dam of which provided the nest site for a large colony of **Alpine Swifts**. We walked beside the reservoir, checking the rock face to our north. Here we had good views of **Black Wheatear**, as well as **Blue Rock Thrush** and **Thekla's Lark**.

We then entered the vast landscape of the Tierra de los Barros, centre of wine-production and olive-growing in Extremadura. We followed tracks across this area near the town of Almendralejo. We had nice views of **Black-eared Wheatear** and eventually excellent views of our target species, the **Rufous-tailed Scrub-Robin**.

We had our picnic in some interesting riverine woodland beside the River Guadiana. Her we found **Spotted Flycatcher**, **Common Nightingales**, **Eurasian Tree Sparrows** and **Eurasian Golden Orioles**.

We completed the day by birding from the two-thousand-year-old Roman Bridge, in the centre of Mérida, the capital city of Extremadura. This was an excellent place, offering us brilliant views of Eurasian Penduline Tit, Western Swamphen, Glossy Ibis, Great Reed Warbler and Pallid Swift.

In the evening, beside the village of Pago de San Clemente we listened to the sound of singing **Red-necked Nightjars**.

12<sup>th</sup> May 2018: Rice fields near Vegas Altas, Moheda Alta, Villuercas Mountains and Madroñera.

We ventured first south to the rice and corn fields near Vegas Altas. Here we found a **Sanderling**, several **Western Yellow Wagtails** and had superb views of feeding **Collared Pratincoles**. We then checked a small pool near Moheda Alta, finding a great collection of shorebirds, including **Curlew Sandpiper**, **Ruff**, **Black-bellied Plover** and **Ruddy Turnstone**, a **Greater Flamingo** and a drake **Garganey**, amongst others.

We then drove to the peak of the Villuercas Mountains, offering us amazing views across the region. We visited a medieval Snow Well, close to which a **Wood Lark** was in song.

At the peak itself, at 5000 feet, we saw a **Peregrine** and **Black Redstart**, whilst on the slopes below it we found a pair of **Rufous-tailed Rock-Thrush**. Returning to base, we crossed a vast expanse of *dehesa* woodland, seeing **Short-toed Snake Eagle**. We made a final stop in a park in the centre of Madroñera, where we luckily found quite quickly a roosting **European Scops Owl**.

## 13<sup>th</sup> May 2018: Arrocampo Reservoir, Gredos Mountains. Navarredondo de los Gredos.

A fresh morning, under blue skies, we bade farewell to Casa Rural El Recuerdo and took the motorway in the direction of Madrid. We stopped at the Arrocampo Reservoir where we eventually found a very obliging Savi's Warbler. We also had excellent views of Eurasian Reed Warbler, Zitting Cisticola, Purple Heron, Little Bittern, Western Swamphen and more distantly, a Common Tern.

We then continued our journey, leaving the motorway near Talavera to ascend the Gredos Mountains, crossing a pass where a Roman Road did the same. This was where we had our picnic. We then proceeded into the heart of the mountains, spending the afternoon birding in the pine woods near Navarredonda. Here we saw several **Pied Flycatchers**, **Goldcrest**, **Crested** and **Coal Tits**, as well as **Red Squirrel**. We reached our hotel at 17.00, where we made good use of the hide facility there to watch **Eurasian Jay** and **Coal Tits**.

After dinner, a **European Nightjar** was heard churring briefly.

### 14th May 2018: Gredos Mountains and return to Madrid.

Pre-breakfast in the hide yielded **Crested Tit** and **Great Spotted Woodpecker**, as well as the return of the **Eurasian Jay**. A **Western Bonelli's Warbler** was singing in front of the hotel as we set off for the high-altitude birding at the Plataforma, at about 6000 feet above sea-level. On the way we stopped in the pine woods near Puente del Duque, where we had good views of **Firecrest**, **Red Crossbills**, **Western Bonelli's Warbler** and **Red-backed Shrike**.

At the Plataforma, we easily found an **Ortolan Bunting** and saw a party of **Iberian Ibex.** The walk from the car park, provided superb views of **Rufous-tailed Rock Thrush**, **Northern Wheatear** and **Dunnock**. We had a long wait for the appearance of **Bluethroat**, which was seen briefly on several occasions.

Returning to the pines for our picnic, we had a flurry of birding with great views of **Cirl Bunting**, more **Red Crossbills**, a **Citril Finch** and **Greater Whitethroat**.

From there we had a good run through to Madrid, passing the walled-city of Ávila, reaching the hotel at Barajas at 16.00.
