TRIP REPORT

11th April 2026: Collection at Madrid

Martin met the group just before 16.00 at Madrid airport Terminal 4 and we were soon making our way onto the ring road around the southern half of Madrid and then onto the Extremadura motorway. We had not even left the city before the first **White Storks** were seen, there would be plenty more on the onward journey! The pall of Sahara dust meant that distant visibility was very poor, the spectacular Gredos Mountains were barely an outline to the north. Nevertheless we could appreciate the diversity of landscapes on the journey from the mainly arable tablelands of La Mancha for the first hour, then the appearance of the evergreen oak *dehesas* starting as we passed Talavera., site of the one of the most important battles of the Peninsula War. Just beyond Talavera, we stopped for break to stretch our legs. The service station carpark was as good a place as any to see our first **Booted Eagle**, **Zitting Cisticolas** and **Corn Buntings**, as well as enjoy the **Barn Swallows** nesting under the awning of the windows of the building, with some nests containing broods just about to fledge.

From there it was just over an hour's drive to base, and again the landscape changed, with areas full of the blossom of rock rose and French lavender, to more *dehesas* and dramatic rocky outcrops. Approaching Trujillo, we entered a granite landscape, covered by weathered outcrops. At Casa Rural El Recuerdo, which we arrived at 19.15, Claudia gave us a warm welcome, equalling that of the **Nightingale** and the pair of **Red-rumped Swallows** which have made their home here.

12th April 2026: Campo Lugar plains, Madrigalejo and Alcollarín Reservoir

The day started fine and quite calm, but by midday a fresh north-easterly wind had developed. There were periods of overcast weather and a few drops of rain. Setting off from Pago de San Clemente, **Nightingales** were in song. We drove southwards, over the divide between the Tagus and Guadiana watersheds and down to the town of Zorita and from there across the plains near the village of Campo Lugar. We surveyed a vast open landscape of mixed farming, where, at our first stop, we watched a group of five very colourful male **Great Bustards** marching at great pace across a field. They joined a younger male and then paused and started feeding. Nick spotted a male **Little Bustard**. Although quite distant, we could see it displaying as it jerked its head back from time to time. Closer to us were **Calandra Larks** and **Corn Buntings**. As we moved across the plains, making a couple of more stops, we watched groups of **Lesser Kestrels** hovering over the fields. **Griffon** and **Black Vultures** glided overhead.

We then moved to a fruit-growing area near the small town of Madrigalejo. Here at our first stop Janet spotted a **Black-winged Kite** in flight and we watched it for some time as it glided and hovered. **Bee-eaters** were on the wires and **White Storks** occupied nests in the scattered evergreen oak trees. At a nearby old gravel working, we had superb views of a **Savi's Warbler** in song. A **Purple Heron** was also seen.

After a very welcome coffee, we drove to the edge of the rice fields, now dry, where we were enchanted by about thirty **Collared Pratincoles**, flying around us and also obliging us with excellent views on the ground. At the nearby Ruercas river, **Nightingales** and **Cetti's Warblers** sang, but there was not much else to justify staying there much longer. So, we crossed the Campo Lugar plains again, this time getting better views of **Roller** and **Lesser Kestrel**.

We then moved to the Alcollarín Reservoir where we spent the rest of the day. At the small subsidiary dam, where we had our picnic, we watched **Purple Heron**, **Cattle Egrets**, **Spoonbill**, a **Great Egret** and an amazing flypast of birds of prey: **Short-toed Eagle**, three **Booted Eagles**, **Red** and **Black Kite** and several **Griffon Vultures**. **Willow Warblers** sang from the trees beside

us and we had quick glimpses of a **Sardinian Warbler**. On the western shore of the lake, standing under trees where **Spanish Sparrows** were nesting, we checked the shoreline for waders, finding a selection including **Common Redshank**, **Greenshank**, **Little Ringed Plover** and **Northern Lapwing**. As we left Alcollarín, we stopped to admire the beautiful **Bee-eaters**.

13th April 2026: Monfragüe National Park

The wind was still fresh throughout the day, making the morning in particular quite chilly. However, we enjoyed sunshine for most of the time, with some clouds gathering in the second half of the afternoon. We drove north, passing Trujillo with its imposing aspect, topped by the ancient Arab fort. Across a landscape of weathered granite outcrops for a few kilometres before we descended onto a vast undulating landscape of *dehesa* wood pasture – for as far as the eye could see. Cattle, sheep, goats and Iberian pigs were in some of the fields.

As we entered Monfragüe National Park, we could see the immense cliff face of the Peña Falcón, opposite which we were to stand for an hour or so, to admire this iconic view and its host of **Griffon Vultures**. Amongst them were **Peregrine**, **Egyptian Vulture** and a few **Black Vulture**. A **Black Stork** stood on her nest, whilst closer at hand there were **Blue Rock Thrush**, **Black Redstart** and **Wren**. It was the chilly weather there which made us move on, and we found some shelter and sunshine beside the Tagus River at the Fuente del Francés. **House Martins** were busy at the bridge and in the mixed woodland there were **Jay** and **Chaffinches**. We found a **Bosca's Newt** in a drinking trough.

Onward to the Puerto de Serrana, at the north-western edge of the park. Here again, all three vulture species were present, but we were especially focused on watching **Subalpine Warblers**. Above us hovered two **Short-toed Eagles**, making their gull-like calls.

At the hamlet of Villarreal de San Carlos we had coffee and watched **Little Ringed Plovers** beside Crested Larks. We then set off to the east, through a scrubby landscape dominated by Gum Cistus, where we saw **Black-eared Wheatear** and **Thekla Lark**. We took a very pleasant circular walk where the star was a very obliging **Dartford Warbler**.

Nearby was our picnic site, opposite a cliff face with breeding **Griffon Vultures**. We continued beside the Tiétar river, stopping to admire an **Egyptian Vulture** at her nest. A stop for ice creams, at the edge of the park, beside a cork oak dehesa gave us the chance to take in for the first time a proper view of the tall Gredos Mountains, with snow still on the peaks. At least three **Woodchat Shrikes** were in the grounds of the small hotel.

We made a final stop at the Portilla del Tiétar, again a place of breeding **Griffon Vultures**. The highlights here were a **Rock Bunting** and a magnificent **Black Stork** which wheeled in front of the cliff face.

In the evening, the chance was taken to admire the bank of **Champagne Orchids** at the entrance of the village.

14th April 2026: Plains between Trujillo and Cáceres and Trujillo

It was a cold and misty start of the day, but by midday the sky was clear and the temperatures rose. We started on the open plains just west of Trujillo. Despite the poor visibility we quickly found a small group of **Great Bustards**, and around us we were accompanied by **Calandra Larks** and **Corn Buntings**. However, the weather was certainly keeping things at bay, so we opted to move further west, closer to the city of Cáceres. We arrived on the plains there just as the weather was improving and we enjoyed an amazing hour or so, glued to the spot, watching a

fascinating mix of birds. In the pasture there were two migrant **Whimbrel**. **Calandra** and **Greater Short-toed Larks** were singing, and we had lovely views of the latter on the ground close to us. A small group of **Black-bellied Sandgrouse** flew passed us.

But it was the birds of prey that were really the stars. Overhead we had close views of an adult **Spanish Imperial Eagle**, a juvenile **Golden Eagle**, **Black** and **Griffon Vultures**, whilst quartering the ground was first a stunning melanistic **Montagu's Harrier** and then a female of the same species.

We paused on an area of higher ground nearby, taking a short walk, where we heard and then saw a **Pin-tailed Sandgrouse** flying overhead. **Lesser Kestrels** were busy around a farm, building.

It was time for coffee and we stopped at a small bar in the village of Santa Marta de Magsaca. We then paused at the side of the Tamuja valley, a scenic spot but rather quiet. Moving to the Magasca River, there were a lot to keep us distracted during the picnic: **Spanish Terrapins** basking on a rock, a displaying **Golden Eagle** overhead and **Crag Martins** closer to us.

Back onto the plains, we had a close encounter with another **Montagu's Harrier** (an orangey immature) and a delightful pair of **Little Owls**. We walked along an ancient drovers' trail, finding three species of orchid in flower and getting views of many **Corn Buntings** and **Calandra Larks**.

Before completing the afternoon with a visit to Trujillo, we made a quick detour to the spot where we had started the day. A **Tawny Pipit** perched on the fence beside the track was an addition to our list. In Trujillo we had ice creams in the Main Square, whilst watching **Pallid** and **Common Swifts**, **White Storks**, **Crag Martins** and a **Lesser Kestrel**. To obtain further views of the latter, we moved to the edge of town, where the main colony is split between two disused grain silos. Here there were perhaps twenty birds at times in the sky above us.

15th April 2026: Alange and Mérida

The weather had changed with very noticeable light southerly winds, clear skies and the temperatures rising considerably. We drove southwards, driving cross country to the village of Santa Cruz de la Sierra before joining the motorway southwards towards Mérida. From Miajadas, we descended to the flood plain of the Guadiana River, an area dominated by arable land and fruit production (peaches and olives). Upon reaching the edge of the small town of Alange, we parked beside the dam of the eponymous reservoir and walked with the reservoir to our right and a rocky outcrop with wild olives and scrub to our left. Almost immediately we had views of our target species, the **Black Wheatear**, a species which only occurs in the western Mediterranean. Also present were **Blue Rock Thrush** and **Rock Bunting**, whilst **Thekla Larks** sang melodically above us. It was a very enjoyable walk, with a strong supporting cast of birds including great views of **Sardinian Warblers** and passing **Gull-billed Terns**.

On our return to the car park, we stopped to admire the large colony of **Alpine Swifts** at the dam itself. We had coffee in the village of Alange, enjoying a selection of birds on the watered football pitch in front of us, including **Common Sandpiper**, **Crested Larks** and a **Little Ringed Plover**. On leaving Alange we stopped in an open arable area where **Collared Pratincoles** were flying and distantly we could see **Black-winged Stilt** and **Spoonbill**. A female **Montagu's Harrier** soared above us.

We then headed to the city of Mérida, parking beside the park where we had our picnic and then spent the afternoon crossing the Roman Bridge and walking on the eastern side of the river to view an egret colony on an island. As we crossed the Roman Bridge, lines of **Glossy Ibis** passed overhead, as did **Cattle Egrets**. **Alpine**, **Common** and **Pallid Swifts** flew past us and below the bridge. A **Purple Heron**, flying low downstream, did the same. We could hear **Penduline Tits** calling, and one flew over the bridge close to us. Entering the park on the other

side of the river, we found a **Penduline Tit** nest hanging high in a eucalyptus tree. Nearby a passage **Pied Flycatcher** was busy foraging from the trees.

Our destination was the colony of egrets and herons on an island just a short distance from the bank. Here at our leisure we could see a **Spoonbill** attending to its three chicks, newly fledged **Glossy Ibis**, showing pink bases to their bills, dozens of white **Cattle Egret** chicks. A **Black-crowned Night Heron** perched for a short time on an open branch. Carefully checking the near shore also revealed a **Purple Swamphen**.

16th April 2026: Jaraicejo, Miravete Pass and western Villuercas

It was another warm and sunny day, with barely a breath of wind – perfect conditions for our first destination! This was an area of Mediterranean scrub, dominated by lavender and broom near Jaraicejo. This is a habitat full of **Thekla Larks** and **Corn Buntings**, with **Dartford Warblers** as well. As we crossed a section of this beautiful habitat, we came across a **Tawny Pipit** sitting along a track. Nearby we could hear the smooth, languid song of a **Western Orphean Warbler**. It was mainly hidden in a tree and afforded us only brief views before it flew. Not downhearted we continued walking into a beautiful cork oak glade. Here there were **Woodlarks** and **Short-toed Treecreepers** singing. We returned to the heath and so had the **Western Orphean Warbler**, and this time it stayed perched to a single spot for long enough for us all to see it through the telescope. Exploring the habitat further, we eventually came across a pair of **Spectacled Warblers**, as well as a **Tree Pipit** which sat in a dead broom bush for an obliging period.

We then stopped at the Arroyo de la Vid, where there were **Nightingales** galore. **Subalpine Warblers** were also giving us excellent views. Coffee followed and we afterwards ascended to

the Miravete Pass. From here we had an amazing view south over the rolling *dehesa* toward Trujillo and north over the valley of the Tagus and the snow-capped Gredos Mountains. A **Golden Eagle** soared close overhead. After our picnic we had superb views of a **Crested Tit** and also watched **Blue Rock Thrush** with nesting material.

We then drove east to the Villuercas Mountains and made our first stop in cork oak woodland near Solana. We had hoped for Bonelli's Eagle, but despite much patience it did not make an appearance. However, there were two **Short-toed Eagles**, several **Griffon Vultures** and small birds like **Short-toed Treecreeper** and **Subalpine Warblers**. We made another stop at some deciduous Pyrenean oak and then a final stop at the edge of mixed woodland. Here there was a **Western Bonelli's Warbler** singing briefly when we arrived and seen by some of the party. **Iberian Green Woodpeckers** were very noisy in the vicinity. A **Scarce Swallowtail** was a butterfly highlight there.

17th April 2026: Garciaz, Arrocampo and El Sierro, Almaráz.

The warm settled weather continued. We spent the first part of the morning in the groves of Pyrenean oak near the village of Garciaz. Here our two target species were heard but not seen (**Wryneck** and **Rock Sparrow**), but we did get views of **Short-toed Treecreeper** and numerous **Woodchat Shrikes**. It was a beautiful area with **Nightingales** giving us quadrophonic sound! We also saw a **Red Fox** and two **Red Deer**.

We then moved northwards to the Arrocampo Reservoir, to walk beside the marsh near the village of Saucedilla (where we had coffee). **Savi's Warblers** were singing well (87 singing birds have been counted there this year!), as well as **Reed Warblers**, **Cetti's Warblers** and **Zitting Cisticolas**. We had wonderful views of **Purple Heron**, **Gull-billed Tern** and brief sightings of **Bearded Tit** and **Purple Swamphen**. After our picnic, where a **Booted Eagle** caused great alarm amongst the **Barn Swallows**. We made a couple more stops at the edge of the marsh, and saw, from the van, a **Squacco Heron**.

We completed the hot afternoon looking at orchids. At the edge of the Almaráz town, there were **Lax-flowered Orchid** in a meadow. Above the town, amongst olive groves, there were still some of the orchids of early spring in flower: **Naked Man, Yellow Bee, Mirror, Woodcock** and **Early Spider**.

It was then back to Casa Rural El Recuerdo, to rest and pack.

18th April 2026: Return to Madrid

With **Scops Owls** calling during the night (heard by Janet) and **Nightingales** serenading us in the morning (heard by everyone) we bade farewell to Casa Rural El Recuerdo and made our way back to Madrid. Unlike the outward journey, we had a clear view of the mountains, with snow still clinging to the peaks. We had a pause just shy of the halfway point for coffee and purchases, and then continued through to the airport, arriving there shortly after 12.00, with ample time for check-in.
