## TRIP REPORT

### 31<sup>st</sup> May 2026: Pick up from Madrid

Martin met Julie and Geoff outside Terminal One of Madrid airport at 11.00 and we headed off straightway on the motorway to Extremadura, seeing **Monk Parakeets** crossing the ring road as we did so. It was a hot and sunny day and the outbound traffic from Madrid on a Sunday was very light, so we made excellent progress. The Gredos Mountains lay to our north, and although a little bit hazy, we could see some patches of snow still on the peaks. Once inside Extremadura, we pulled over for a bit to eat near Saucedilla and then proceeded to Martin's favourite dragonfly pool near Casatejada. Here we spent an hour or so before the heat of the late afternoon, encouraged us back to the car and onward to base. It was a productive visit though with great views of several dragonfly species including **Violet Dropwing**, **Northern Banded Groundling**, **Broad Scarlet** and several delightful **White Featherlegs**. **Bee-eaters** swopped over the water, doubtless also interested in dragonflies, and we saw **Black** and **Griffon Vultures**, and both **Red** and **Black Kites**.



Once at Casa Rural El Recuerdo, where Claudia was there to welcome us, it was an opportunity for a rest before dinner and an evening walk afterwards, with **Nightingales** coming out to feed on the sides of the road.

### 1<sup>st</sup> June 2026: Jaraicejo heath, Casatejada and Monfragüe

It was again a hot and sunny day, with the temperature reaching the high thirties by mid-afternoon. We drove first to the heath and cork oak groves north of Jaraicejo. Here we had a lovely walk, with bird activity constantly around us. The **Thekla Larks** were especially active and so were the **Dartford Warblers**. At the edge of the woodland, we came across our first **Western Orphean Warblers** and during the course of our stay we had some excellent views of birds singing and foraging. **Turtle Doves** were calling constantly too, but we only managed to see a

bird in flight. Further along on the heath we had a tremendous view of a male **Spectacled Warbler** in song, at times perched alongside a **Dartford Warbler**.

After coffee nearby, we returned to the pool near Casatejada to look at the dragonflies, despite revisiting the site less than 24 hours afterwards, we added two new species: an ovipositing **Green Hooktail** and an **Epaulet Skimmer**. The number and density of **Violet Dropwings** was very high, and they aggressively saw off intruders of other species from their patches.

We drove through to the Monfragüe National Park and had our picnic in the shade of the picnic area at Villareal de San Carlos. We were entertained by glimpses of **Golden Orioles**, but at one moment, when a passing truck disturbed them, perhaps seven flew out of the same tree! Nearby was a small pond with a lovely selection of dragonflies and damselflies including **Dainty Bluet** and **Broad-bodied Chaser**. A couple of **Viperine Snakes** were also present. A fine female **Red Deer** walked by and plonked herself down in a secluded mud hollow.

We completed our visit in the shade woodland of the Fuente de Frances, where we had sightings of **Alpine Swift** amongst the throngs of House Martins. Butterflies there were interesting with **Two-tailed Pasha**, **Spanish Purple Hairstreak** and **Nettle-tree Butterfly** being just a selection.

**2<sup>nd</sup> June 2026: River Guadiana at Don Benito, south of Mérida, Roman Bridge at Mérida and Alcollarín**



It was slightly less hot today, with a freshening breeze and some high cloud cover. We drove along a country road to Santa Cruz de la Sierra before joining the motorway and then crossing the irrigated arable land beyond Miajadas. We took a highway southward to the outskirts of Don Benito. Here we walked along a levee between the Guadiana River and old gravel workings, with gallery woodland of eucalyptus and willow. The place was alive with **Golden Orioles**, whilst some **Alpine Swifts** glided overhead. **Nightingales** sang from the undergrowth, and we had short views of a **Penduline Tit**. Two juvenile **Black-crowned Night Herons** flew

from their roost. Eventually we managed to get a succession of views of our target: **Western Olivaceous Warbler**, giving short bursts of song, usually from cover. **Tree Sparrows** were also present at the edge of the river.

We then moved south of Mérida to a gravelly area of scrub, tamarisk, poplars and eucalyptus. Here too we had views of a **Western Olivaceous Warbler**. A fine **Booted Eagle** made a stoop in the distance, causing consternation amongst the **Iberian Magpies**. An **Epaulet Skimmer** was also seen.

After coffee beside the Roman Bridge in Mérida, we enjoyed an hour or so of watching three species of swift: **Alpine**, **Pallid** and **Common** at very close quarters. **Purple** and **Grey Herons** passed over, along with **Glossy Ibis** and **Cattle Egrets**. We had a good view of a perched **Hoopoe** and **Golden Orioles** were calling from the parkland on either side of the river. After our picnic in the park, we then drove back to base for a rest.



After dinner, we went to the nearby Alcollarín Reservoir. Although the Red-necked Nightjars failed to make an appearance (perhaps it was too windy), we watched at least three species of bat and had lovely views of an **Iberian Hare** in our headlights.

### **3<sup>rd</sup> June 2026: Villuercas peak, Castañar de Ibor, Trujillo**

The wind had eased, so we enjoyed a perfect day for the Villuercas Mountains, although it became hot by the afternoon. We drove south-east, through Zorita and past Logrosán and Cañamero, and finally past Guadalupe, to start our steep ascent to the peak of the Villuercas Mountains. This took us through one, sweet chestnut and Pyrenean oak woodland, before we entered the scrubby heathland near the peak. This was dominated by stunted, almost elfin Pyrenean oak and ericaceous species. We took in the superb views from the peak over much of Extremadura and beyond. There was not a soul and the silence was incredible, broken only by

the song of **Rock Buntings**, **Black Redstarts**, chitterings of **House Martins** and **Crag Martins**, the wheezy notes of **Red-rumped Swallows** and some distant **Red-billed Choughs**. Butterflies at that altitude included several **Wall Brown**, **Queen of Spain Fritillary** and a smart **Purple-shot Copper**. We also had good views of two juvenile **Ocellated Lizards** and a couple of **Geniez's Wall Lizards**.



We descended and made a stop in deciduous woodland. There were clusters of butterflies here including **Spanish Gatekeeper** and **Meadow Fritillary**. From there we returned to the main road and drove north to the edge of the mountain range, at Castañar de Ibor. After coffee at a small filling station (where an **Egyptian Vulture** glided past and we were mesmerised by the packs of **Common Swifts**), our first stop was an extraordinary walk along a favourite track of ours through Pyrenean Oak and Sweet Chestnut. **Common Goldenring** zoomed in and out of the little stream beside us. A **Copper Demoiselle** and later some **Beautiful Demoiselles** were seen. But most breathtaking was the huge numbers of butterflies (almost all **Meadow Browns**) that moved about a foot off the ground, all flying down the track as we ascended. At a watercourse which crossed a side-track there were clouds of **Meadow Browns** and **Painted Ladys** on the wet earth, alongside others: including **Small Skipper**, **Nettle-tree Butterfly**, **Large Tortoiseshell**, **Cleopatra**, **Holly Blue** and **Common Grayling**. A couple of **Amanda's Blue** were also present.

We had our picnic, just south along the road, affording us a wonderful view across the escarpment. Then it was back to Castañar de Ibor, this time to walk beside the river. The clear water had trout and **Grey Wagtails** were present. **Golden Orioles** called. The dragonflies were a delight. **Western Demoiselles** displayed close to the bankside vegetation. **Small Pincertails** perched on rocks, there were **Epaulet Skimmer** and **Broad Scarlet** and a beautiful **Orange-winged Dropwing** was also present, obliging us with lovely views as it returned to its favourite perch.



We then returned to Trujillo, via Deleitosa, completing a large loop that had encompassed the Villuercas from south to north. In the evening we had a memorable and beautiful evening in the main square of Trujillo., enjoying dinner in La Meseguera restaurant and watching the swifts, **Lesser Kestrel** and **White Stork** as dusk approached. As we left, the square illuminated, Venus and Jupiter shone brightly to the north-west.

**4<sup>th</sup> June 2026: Arrocampo Reservoir, Ramacastañas, Pico Pass**



We bade farewell to Claudia and to Casa Rural El Recuerdo and started our journey to the mountains. But first there was a stop at the Arrocampo reservoir. We visited four sites, different places at or close to the reservoir and resulted in a superb morning's birding. Highlights included three **Black-winged Kites**, perhaps seven **Squacco Herons**, a juvenile **Great Spotted Cuckoo**, nest-building **Black-crowned Night Herons**, a male **Lesser Kestrel** - the list could continue. This was despite rather windy conditions which made locating singing **Savi's Warblers** rather hard.

Following coffee at Saucedilla we drove up to the foothills of the Gredos near Ramacastañas. We searched a couple of places for Spanish Fritillary but without success, probably because it was too late in the season. However, the time was well rewarded with a selection of great species including **Orange Featherleg**, **Melodious Warbler** and **Iberian Marbled White**. After lunch in the town and a second butterfly site visited, we made our steep ascent to the Pico Pass.



Our stop here was amazingly productive with a host of very attractive butterflies including **Black-veined White**, **Niobe Fritillary**, **Mountain Argus** and **Heath Fritillary**. There were some gorgeously bizarre **Owflies** too. We continued along the Tormes valley, reaching Hostel Almansor at about 18.30.



#### **5<sup>th</sup> June 2026: Plataforma de los Gredos, Tormes River, pines below the Parador**

There was a chill to the morning, but the sky had barely light cloud cover and it remained sunny for all day, despite the forecast of overcast conditions. As we set off from the Hostel Almansor there was a **Common Chiffchaff** singing along with **Western Bonelli's Warblers**. We drove to the Plataforma, the high-altitude car park giving access to the highest part of the Gredos range and we walked along the granite path to over 1900 metres. As we set off, indeed throughout the whole walk, we were accompanied by the evocative song of **Ortolan Buntings**. **Northern Wheatears** were also in good numbers, and we watched males performing their song flights. Reaching more open grassland, **Skylarks** then became the dominant sound. Other birds included **Rock Bunting**, (Iberian) **Dunnoek**, **Yellow Wagtail** and the sound of **Quail**. As we descended, we had an unforgettable moment watching **Red-tailed Rock Thrush** performing its song flights overhead. **Spanish Ibex** sat or stood proud on the skyline.

As we drive back down towards the Tormes valley we saw a **Red-backed Shrike** and an **Ocellated Lizard** stood at the edge of the road. We had coffee at a bar giving magnificent views over the Gredos range. We then returned to the Tormes River where we had our picnic. We then walked beside the river. In the pines there were **Common Crossbills**, **Firecrests**, **Pied Flycatchers** and **Crested Tits**. Two **Tree Pipit** were also seen. But what was particularly memorable about the walk were the flower-filled banks and the variety of butterflies and other insects.

We completed the afternoon looking for Citril Finch in the pine woods near the Parador. Despite failing on that objective, we did see **Pied Flycatcher**, **Common Redstart**, **Crested Tit** and a **Honey Buzzard**.

6<sup>th</sup> June 2026: La Covatilla, River Tormes at Navalcepeda



The day dawned rather overcast but as we drove to our destination the clouds had moved and from then on, we had clear blue skies and little wind. These were perfect conditions for our first stop at La Covatilla ski station at nearly 6500 feet above sea-level. Unlike the rocky terrain at La Plataforma, here we were surrounded by open and gentle broom scrub. This area holds a good population of **Bluethroat** and from the vicinity of the large car park we saw several birds. These sightings included birds singing from perches atop of broom tussocks, carrying food for chicks and some impressive song flights. Another bird watched doing a song flight was **Tawny Pipit**. Other species included **Red-backed Shrike**, **Water Pipit**, **Ortolan Bunting** and **Northern Wheatear**.



We descended toward the town of Bejar for coffee and then retraced our steps a short distance to explore an area of more open, sun-exposed lavender scrub for butterflies and other insects. We found **Lesser Spotted Fritillary**, **Marsh Fritillary**, **Black-eyed Blues** and a selection of orchids including **Stately Marsh Orchid**, **Bug Orchid** and some impressive **Common Tongue Orchids**. A **Woodlark** sang from a cable above our heads. Luckily there was some shade to enjoy our picnic.

In the afternoon we walked a short way beside the River Tormes near Navalcepeda de Tormes. Here too we found **Lesser Spotted Fritillary** and **Adonis Blue**. We had lovely views of a **Bonelli's Warblers** as well.



We completed the day enjoying a viewpoint looking south over the Gredos mountain range.

**7<sup>th</sup> June 2026: River Tormes near Hoyos del Espino, Viewpoint to east, Parador Pines and walk to east of Parador.**

We enjoyed another warm and sunny day with conditions ideal for exploring the pine woods along the Tormes River. We started with a walk upstream from the Hoyos del Espino bridge. We found a **Tree Pipit** and the pines were full of **Chaffinches**, **Short-toed Treecreepers**, **Crested Tits** and **Western Bonelli's Warblers**. We saw a pair of **Dippers** flying upstream. **Orange-tips**, **Comma** and **Green-underside Blue** were some of the butterflies that were new for the holiday. Geoff caught a glimpse of a **Red Squirrel** too.

Following coffee beside the river we went to the viewpoint between Hoyos and Navarredonda. Some raptors were seen (**Booted Eagles** and both **kites**) but the insects were also of interest including mating **Owflies** and **Lesser Spotted Fritillary**. We had our picnic there too.



This was followed by a walk below the Parador with good views of **Common Redstart** and **Pied Flycatcher**, **Crested Tit** and **Firecrest**. We concluded the afternoon with a short exploration of the beautiful pine woods just to the east. Here a **Song Thrush** in song was our first for the week.

#### **8<sup>th</sup> June 2026: Return to Madrid**

Leaving at 06.00 to the sound of a singing **Woodlark**, we sadly left the Gredos Mountains behind us, descending on their northern flank to the impressive walled city of Ávila, where we joined the motorway to Madrid. The traffic, even after entering Madrid and following the ring road to the airport was lighter than we had anticipated, so we arrived in excellent time at the airport (08.45), even having made a stop for breakfast. It was the conclusion of the final holiday at El Recuerdo, fully of memories and special moments wrapping together with all the wonderful, shared encounters with nature over the years.
